President's Foreward

Season 2020-2021 had a "can do" theme in which the spirit and determination of North Steyne was at its best. In the face of constant uncertainty, our members really pulled together, and we had very dedicated patrols, hosted a number of carnivals and moved forward in a number of key strategic areas for the Club.

In our 114th season, we can proudly say that once again no lives were lost on North Steyne Beach whilst on patrol. This is because of our exceptional surf lifesavers, great patrol captains, our outstanding trainers and a focus on teamwork.

Our membership numbers held steady this season with a healthy increase in our Nippers. Thank you to all our members who returned to the Club and we welcomed 32 new Bronze Medallion holders and 25 SRCs to our patrols over the season.

Looming large in the background all season was COVID-19. Like all other surf lifesaving clubs, we put extra precautions in place, occasionally needed to close our clubhouse, and we worked diligently to keep our safety plans up to date. Sadly, COVID-19 caused the cancellation or postponement of some of our key events including our 2019-2020 end of season presentation (delivered online through Club website), Christmas party (cancelled) and AGM (postponed). By very bad luck, our 2021 presentation night had to be also postponed, but fortunately, we were able to reschedule this. Thanks to all our members for your patience and understanding as we navigated our new COVID world.

To start the season, but also conclude our last one, our AGM was held on 12th September 2020 at the Club. It was a bit subdued with only 30 people allowed to attend. Nevertheless, it was great to get together and reflect on all our achievements and talk about our future plans.

At the AGM, we welcomed back a very experienced team to the Board with Jack Sutherland as Deputy President, Tony Falzarano as Treasurer, Dan Hillier as Club Captain, Jack Watt as Vice-Captain, Trae Hare-Boyd as Chief Instructor, Brian Mariotti as Nipper's Director, Hillary Burrows as Assistant Nipper's Director, David Cowell as Marketing Director, Jodie Fraser as Youth Director and Claire Oxlade as General Activities Director. Sarah Lally stepped up to be Competition Director and Frank Traugott, our former President, returned as Secretary.

We also welcomed a number of new assistants to the Board with Hanna Clare to Education, Jo Cooper to Youth, Alex Salier to Marketing, Janice Faaolatane to General Activities and Deb Foote to Competition. With this fantastic team, we were all ready for the season and were looking forward

to a very busy summer ahead.

Stepping down from our Board was Tracey Hare-Boyd. It was fantastic that she took on her new role as the first female President of Sydney Northern Beaches



Branch. We are very proud of Tracey and all she has done for the surf lifesaving movement.

We started the season on a high when we won 3 awards at the Surf Life Saving New South Wales Awards of Excellence which were held virtually. Congratulations to Trae Hare-Boyd for being awarded Young Volunteer of the Year, Joe Mastrangelo for Assessor of the Year and to the North Steyne team for winning the Community Education Award for our Gaza Surf Life Saving project. An amazing achievement and a great way to roll into the new season.



During the season we hosted three carnivals on North Steyne Beach. This is always a big effort for our Club and to have 3 in one season was really going above and beyond for our volunteers and strongly reflects our "can do" spirit. Under the guiding hand of Sarah Lally, we staged a Nippers' Water Carnival in November, the Australia Day Boat Carnival in January and the Sydney North Beaches Branch Beach Carnival in February. All three carnivals were very successful and it was great seeing so much black and gold on our own beach.

Our competitors came out in force this season and we saw our training sessions greatly increase in

both frequency and number of participants. Our Nippers did very well in carnivals and we had the largest contingent attend the NSW Junior State Championships that we have had in many years. Not only was North Steyne well represented, but we brought home a number of medals and top 10 placings.

Our Opens, Masters and Boats also had a great season. Our Champion Lifesaver competitors blitzed the Sydney North Beaches Branch competition with a record haul of gold medals won. Our success continued at the NSW and Australian Championship. A special congratulations goes to Shannon Job who took home the gold in the 30-39 yrs Male Champion Lifesaver. Another big congratulations also goes to Caroline Yarnell who brought home silver at Aussies in the 60-64 yrs Women 1km beach run. There were many other great placings which resulted in a fantastic result for North Steyne!

Our Boats really picked up pace with some new crews, particularly in the younger age groups. Thanks to our dedicated sweeps and to all our Boaties for being such a great part of our Club and lending an extra hand with other activities.

Behind the scenes we were busy working on the masterplan for our clubhouse. After a presentation at the AGM, we undertook more consultations and submitted a re-worked plan to the Northern Beaches Council in March. Further, while people were busy on the beach, a number of us were busy thinking about our future. We held several meetings and have commenced putting in place a strategy and defining our goals to 2025. What is clear is that we have many strengths we can build on to make us a stronger Club in the future. We also have many smart and passionate people that can help get us there.



Away from our beach, we assisted with flood rescue efforts during the wild weather in March. A special thanks to Jack Watt and team who volunteered as part of our emergency services obligations. We also had over 80 volunteers assist with the Sun Herald Sun Run, and we provided an IRB crew and lifesavers for the Cerebral Palsy 20 Twenty Fundraising event.

This season we also farewelled our Office Manager Audrey Bruen. For eight years, Audrey ensured the smooth running of the Club and we thank her for her dedication and the great work she provided. Cath Hillier has stepped into this role and she has made a number of improvements already. We are very lucky to have Cath in this role.

To our key sponsors and supporters the Balgowlah RSL, Manly Lions and Ned Australian Whiskey, our new Boaties sponsor, our Patrons James Griffin, David Hay and Jean Hay AM, Des McAteer, our members, and to all my fellow North Steyne Directors, thank you for your great support and outstanding contribution. Our can-do attitude once again has put us head and shoulders above the rest and we continue our proud tradition of serving the community on North Steyne beach.


Deputy President's Report

It was an unusual but good season. Whilst there was considerable disruption due to covid19, club members worked together when needed to pull off some impressive accomplishments during the season. Despite considerable obstacles North Steyne's attitude of "we can do" was on display for all to see. That attitude turned what would have been an ordinary season into a good season.

We have a long history of "we can do" within the club, often with limited resources and significant challenges. We have had success with running some large carnivals and pioneering surf lifesaving activities in other parts of the world. North Steyne has hosted the Australian SLS Championships in the early 1900's, the Queen Mother's SLS carnival in 1958, trained lifesavers and conducted lifesaving patrols on the island of Jersey in the 1950's and 60's. We also trained Palestinian lifesavers at North Steyne in 2019 to help them establish a lifesaving capability on Gaza Beach in Palestine. There is an energy that surrounds this club when we run or are asked to be involved with these types of events.

One of the highlights for me this season was hosting the surf boat carnival as part of the Australia Day weekend. Surf boat racing has special significance in our history, we are the only club to have won eight Australian open surf boat titles. It was great to have the surf boats competing on our stretch of beach to honour that legacy. It was also good to see our member crews compete as well contribute, along with other hard working members of our club, to make that carnival an outstanding success.

Another highlight this season was the successful running of the water Nipper's carnival. Thanks to the Nipper section for their involvement. Special mention to Sarah Lally who stepped up to be Competition Director this season and did a fantastic job leading all our carnival efforts. It is also always good to see our "ripper nippers" on our beach under the tireless direction of David Cowell.



I was especially pleased to be present at the launching of the new IRB which was named in honour of Richard Donaldson. Given all that Richard has done and continues to do for the IRB section it was a fitting honour.



It was unfortunate that our annual ocean swim, our major fundraiser and marquee public community event, was cancelled for the second year in a row because of COVID-19.

Our BBQ's are an important source of revenue for the club. They too were disrupted because of the pandemic but when we were able to open it was good to see my old mates from the A team back together, doing what they do best to support the club. Thanks to our leader Keith Crampton and the rest of my A team buddies Ron Morton, David O'Brien, Jim Kernaghan and Ray Grose. Our "A minus team" was also active on the BBQ. It was good to see them around the club. Thanks to Trevor Lane, Rick Higgins, Lex Tall, Bill Minnett, George Paton, John Land, Geoff Kirby and Gary Headland.

Last year I said that I would like to see more teams of this kind come together and it looks like it's happening. Arthur McCarroll has put his hand up to form a third senior BBQ team. They will be called "Triple A" (because they're full of energy just like the battery). I would also like to acknowledge the General Activities team of Claire and Janice for all their hard work this season. Claire puts in a considerable number of hours, not just to support the BBQ but also to help organise social and other functions such as presentation nights for the club.

It is a pleasure to work with someone as talented and committed as our President, Chris Stewart. We always seem to be on the same page. We have similar views and level of urgency on what can be done to save our club building from further deterioration. Sadly, it has been neglected for a considerable period of time. It is disappointing when things are promised but not delivered.

Congratulations and thanks to all members of the North Steyne SLSC for your contribution this season. Thank you also for continuing our proud legacy of "no lives lost" in 114 years on North Steyne beach whilst our surf lifesavers have been on patrol.

Secretary's Report

It is often said that no two seasons in a surf club are the same. No matter how well you plan things the next season never turns out the way you expect. There is always something that surprises you. That was particularly true of this past season.

With the early closure of the previous season due to the COVID-19 global pandemic we had no way of predicting what was going to happen this season. But we did know that it would be interrupted and uncertain. It was!

There were some big changes and increased demand on administration this season. After the 2020 AGM I returned to the Board as Secretary, Cath Hillier moved to Assistant Secretary and Audrey Bruen continued as Administration Manager. "Team Admin" also supported Hillary Burrows with registration and administration for Nippers and supported Tony Falzarano with financial management, payments, Xero and online business banking practices.

Cath continued on the COVID-19 committee with Chris Stewart, Dan Hillier, Paul Mathew and myself. This was a complex and constantly changing new agenda that required leadership, urgent action, well written policies, clear communication and meticulous implementation.

Whilst there was expert direction provided by NSW health advisors and the NSW Government as well as surf lifesaving affiliated bodies, this new agenda and response had to be developed within the club at short notice without any history or experience. It was a huge health risk that required immediate response. It literally, at times, stopped us in our tracks.

It was a mammoth and complex task that required brave decisions and persistent insistence on compliance. Our COVID committee did an extraordinary job in managing and implementing that effort. Tracey Hare-Boyd, our branch President and valued North Steyne club member, was also instrumental in her branch leadership role with assisting Sydney Northern Beaches clubs navigate through the pandemic.

The first challenge for the North Steyne directors became evident at the first Board meeting in September 2020. Chris Stewart, in opening, provided the following wise words

"there will be challenges ahead as processes are still uncertain, but we all need to remain vigilant and no one is alone here, we are all in this together and decisions are to be made together".

As matters turned to business we wondered whether we would have any members? Could

we run any events? What would we likely have to cancel? Will we have to shut down the club? How would our financials be affected? Expectations were low. As a membership based organisation we were concerned about our



membership; the numbers as well as their health and safety.

What the club achieved this season is well beyond those expectations. Membership remained steady despite the loss of Riverview and Redlands because of COVID-19. That is an exceptional result. Credit must be given to Hillary Burrows and Brian Mariotti for expanding Nippers and engaging Nipper parent involvement.

Given we were all told, at various times, by the NSW Government to "stay at home" our next challenge was to work out how we could run the club. The answer was very apparent given that a considerable part of the world had shifted from "face to face" to "zoom" meetings. During the season we ran nine Board meetings. Four were "face to face" only, four were combination meetings of "face to face" and "zoom", and one was "zoom only". The four combination meetings were run to allow greater flexibility for Board members at a time when people were not strictly required to "stay at home". That practice became the new normal. Generally, attendance at Board meetings by Directors was good, especially given COVID-19.

As the season progressed there were always issues for administration concerning member access, security, compliance and updating COVID safety plans as the restrictions were tightened or eased. None of these would have occurred in any

non-pandemic season. They added considerable load to the club's administration.

One pleasing thing that occurred this season was the historical project by SLSA to provide a framed numbered cap to all SLSA life members or their families to honour their contribution. Unfortunately, the luncheon that was to be held to present those framed numbered caps to life members was cancelled due to restrictions. Instead they were sent to the club.

Of more than 293 life members of SLSA, 41 of whom were from Sydney Northern Beaches, North Steyne proudly has had six SLSA life members. Only Freshwater has had more SLSA life members than North Steyne from Sydney Northern Beaches clubs. We honour their legacy.

It is also a reminder of how fortunate we are at North Steyne.

On a positive note, I was especially pleased to be Secretary to support Chris Stewart and all directors. It was an opportunity to return the loyalty and support Chris gave me, with our roles now reversed. It was also pleasing to see how she was managing as President with some especially challenging issues this season.

Succession planning and finding the best leaders is critical to any organisation. You know your job is done when you find a person that is willing and more than capable of filling your role. Chris is very capable and doing a good job. We need to support our President for North Steyne to succeed.

Particular thanks to Cath who has changed roles and done a considerable amount of "heavy lifting" in administration this season. Thanks Cath for your efforts. It has not been easy.

I am looking forward to next season. No doubt there will be new and big challenges ahead!

EDUCATION

Education is a key element in training members for any organisation. To remain proficient, lifesavers have to continuously update their skills against modern standards. Training requires a significant commitment of time for new candidates, trainers, and assessors.

Education this season was particularly challenging. There were new manuals, online materials, and guidelines for completely revised bronze & SRC courses. When the pandemic hit, much of that had to be re-worked at short notice to deliver and assess bronze & SRC training in a safe and different COVID safe way. At the beginning of this season, with lockdown, we did not know what courses were feasible or whether we had any candidates. It is a testament to the commitment of our candidates, trainers, and assessors that we were able to achieve what we did. Congratulations and thank you!



Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC)

Twenty-five members completed their SRC. Undertaken by U14 members this award marks a transition from nippers to the senior club through cadets. There were challenges. Water safety came under close scrutiny and our policies and practices needed review. Despite this it was impressive to watch our candidates grow in confidence and skill in surf conditions that, at times, were challenging. Teamwork was also evident when our U14s supported their fellow candidates with completing tasks. After their assessment our new SRCs were rostered and became contributing members of active patrols.

Congratulations to all our SRC's and thank you to their supportive parents, the COVID-19 Marshalls, the U14 age managers, Jodie Fraser, Jo Cooper, Brian Mariotti, Kyra Jenkins, Deb Foote, Frank Traugott and importantly all the water safety that helped out.

First Aid

Performing first aid is a major component of our patrols, and first aid courses provide a higher level of skill and training for patrolling members. There were two courses run by Jamie Twight from Accidental Education. His decades of experience as a paramedic put a new slant on "first aid" training with lots of experiences shared from his paramedic career. Congratulations to the 29 members who completed this course and to Jamie for his expert training.

IRB Awards

Inflatable Rescue Boats (IRB) are the centrepiece equipment used in rescue in modern surf lifesaving. They require advanced skill to be able to operate in surf. They can be dangerous if not handled properly. Throughout IRB Crew training, candidates learn to crew the IRB in a range of surf conditions and assist in rescues within and beyond the break and general surveillance. This season we had 14 candidates complete the course under the expert guidance and tutelage of our own IRB assessor/ trainer Richard Donaldson and trainer David Guthrie. Congratulations to all our new IRB crew. Thank you Richard and David, your continued commitment and support is appreciated.

Beach Management

The Beach Management award equips lifesavers to efficiently run a patrol and manage any incidents that may arise during patrol. The skills gained through this award are essential for the efficient running of each of our 14 North Steyne patrols. North Steyne had seven members complete their Beach Management award this season.

Proficiencies

Proficiencies are always a logistical challenge at the beginning of every season, with COVIDsafe protocols to meet, it was even more so this year. There was the usual rush of trying to get our members proficient and into Surfguard before 31st December cut-off and the added problem of COVID-19lockdowns for Sydney Northern Beaches just before Christmas made this impossible. This lead to some leniency from our peak state body. Compliance and Gear Inspection





IRB Captain's Report

It's only been 37 years that IRBs, in some form, have been operating off our beaches. They are our most expensive and visible asset on the beach. At close to \$20,000 for each fully equipped craft, it's not often that any surf club can outlay for another. The cost of each craft is only exceeded by the value of the capability it brings during patrolling season, for water safety and the range of Surf Life Saving competition through the year.

North Steyne SLSC now have three operational IRB's with the dedication of the 'Richard Donaldson', a class 1 (soft hull) Thundercat on 11 April 2021. Richard has been instrumental in the maintenance of our club's IRB capability for some time and

he was appropriately recognised with the inaugural dedication of our newest IRB here at the Club. Many of our Life members, Board members and families attended this auspicious event which culminated in christening the new craft as Richard gave his namesake a run. Well deserved Richard!

Our readiness to undertake IRB operations as a part of the state emergency services was tested earlier this year with a forward deployment of eight IRB's from a range of North Beaches branch clubs in support of flood affected communities in the Central Coast region of NSW. Our IRB personnel represented North Steyne SLSC strongly and demonstrated our capacity to step-up at short notice. Thank you to Michael Altenberger and Jack Watt for their rapid response.

In training, we have conducted two IRB Crew courses and qualified 14 new 'Crewies' this season. Congratulations to Matthew Riordan, Salvador Ribeiro, Sarah Lally, Emilia Cimino, Jessica O'Reilly, Kathryn Tucker, Lachlan Bennett, Liam Wheen, Antonio Remedios, Harry Hogan, Aaron McCloskey, Craig Shadbolt, Lou Lou Stanley and Scott Turner.

Next up will be an IRB Driver's course to finally qualify a few individuals who have been quietly building their skill to tackle the next assessment, so keep listening out for a call for nominations as we approach the next season.

Youth Director's Report

Whilst we adjusted to an unprecedented offseason under COVID-19 conditions, Youth activity for the 2020-21 season kicked off with a little uncertainty. We would normally train and socialise year-round, however, due to COVID-19 restrictions, we were unable to continue this. Group time has been invaluable in the past, allowing the club's Youth to train and upskill and to build and maintain friendship groups, which often extend past the patrol season, into the community and beyond. All North Steyne friends are a potential BFF (a "person's best friend" if you are not up with the acronym) – as demonstrated by our "youthful" A-Team who continue to socialise in and around the Club, several decades after many had first met at the club as youth members.

Despite the constraints of newly imposed COVID-19 restrictions, there were some "good" SLSA changes introduced this season. We saw the rollout of the new online learning platform for education and skills maintenance which was enthusiastically embraced by our Youth members. It was a great opportunity for Youth engagement where the student became the teacher. On a few occasions, young and not so young heads were huddled over phones scrolling and demo's taking place with our Youth in charge of the conversation. Such a wonderful sight!

As restrictions eased throughout the season, our Youth returned to group training, proficiencies, patrols and surf sports. Overall, our Youth numbers are slightly down on last season, but on par with SNB Branch membership trends. Our Youth currently represent 45% of our club's total patrolling membership and last season contributed to over 60% of all total patrolling hours. A truly dedicated bunch juggling patrols, study, work, sports and life commitments.

On top of patrols, several youth members represented North Steyne at State and Branch lifesaving workshops, a Marine Rescue SAREX Program, Drone Operators Intro Course, SLNSW Lifesaving Development Camp (Team Leaders & Participants), the Young Leadership Camp and Junior Lifesaver of the Year through branch.

Youth were active in many parts of the Club this season including Rescue of the Month nomination, SLS branch carnival winners, medalists and finalists, club carnival volunteers – workforce, water safety, First Aid, revival of junior surf boat crews, assistance with Nippers and Ripper Nippers water safety and beach coordination, assistance on the BBQ, water safety at community events and club Strategic Planning Workshops. We are fortunate to have a committed group of young members. Thank you to our youth and families that have contributed to make North Steyne SLSC a great club. Our future is in good hands.

Our youth were also upskilling with eight new IRB Crew, another eight gaining their Adavanced Resuscitation Technique (ART) and 14 new Bronzies. Thank you to all the trainers and assessors who assisted with their training.

We had one of the biggest and most resilient groups for several years with 25 SRC's completing their assessment, in some cases after five months of training. This group joins the sixth year of the Noughties cadet program (those born from 2000-2009) and the coveted "Noughties" hoody, complete with name/nickname on the back which remains a firm staple in the North Steyne SLSC teen wardrobe. We are now seeing "No.3" in the Hoody nicknames, referring to the 3rd sibling to go through the cadet program. Hopefully that will continue.

Ripper Nippers

It is exciting to see that the SLSA Inclusive Beaches program continues to expand across Australia with more surf clubs making it possible for nippers with disabilities to participate on the beach beside their peers each week.

The North Steyne Ripper Nipper program enjoyed its 8th season on our beach with 35 Ripper Nippers and their siblings joined by the families and the five or six regular North Steyne cadets who are their mentors and water safety. This is regularly bolstered by Jodie Frazer and Jo Cooper always willing to help and take charge as required.

Inclusion is all about acceptance, participation, education and most importantly fun. Each week our participants undertake the regular program and are encouraged with support to learn new skills or try something different. We continue to transition our Rippers to mainstream Nippers where possible.

The season was challenged by social distancing and a Northern Beaches lockdown due to COVID-19, but we were still able to kick off in October. We had several new Rippers join us on the beach and we said goodbye to Dean and Lachlan who both moved to Queensland in December. They will enrol in new schools and intend to join surf clubs on the Gold Coast that run similar programs.

A couple of Ripper Nipper sessions coincided with patrol commitments this season, so our Rippers received a hands-on lesson about the equipment used on patrol, meeting the patrol team and learning about first aid. Our last session for the season was also a patrol day where our beach was visited by an aquatic animal which kept us entertained and provided some great photos



Unfortunately, there were no carnivals for our Rippers this season with the dates having to be postponed because of restrictions. The plans are to have a carnival early in the next season.

Surf Sports Director's Report

When the season kicked off in October 2020, there was still uncertainty around how and if we would be able to do any carnivals or events this season. However, this season ended up seeing North Steyne host three carnivals and saw an increase in our competitors, in particular for our Boat crews, Lifesaving and Master's competitors in addition to more members joining in for our regular Sunday morning training sessions. So pleasing, that we put on an additional Saturday morning session too. The Boaties maintained their sponsorship with Manly Longboard Co, Pure Legal and secured a new sponsor in Ned Australian Whisky.

Carnivals

This season a lot of due diligence and management was carried out in the background to ensure we were able to run all our carnivals in a COVID safe way. For all our carnivals, despite a very limited time frame of organizing and running the carnivals, all the carnivals were successfully run without any issues. Our first carnival, the Nippers Water Carnival in November, had over 350 Nippers competing from the branch. The weather and water were perfect; and a great opportunity for some of our nippers to have a go at their first carnival.



A localized COVID-19 outbreak was very close to jeopardizing the hosting of the amazing Australia Day Boat Carnival! In true North Steyne spirit, with ten days' notice we were able to pull off a very successful two-day carnival. At Aussies, Caroline picked up silver in the 1km beach run (60-64) and Sal had a good campaign for the Sprints (4th) and Flags (7th) and left with a hamstring injury; the type of injury that we all dread when we compete in the masters age group!

Lifesaving Competition

This season we had a large cohort of competitors for Champion Lifesaver, with the recruitment of four amazing U17 females: Jess O'Reilly, Kathryn Tucker, Emilia Cimino and Evie Farrell.



With only two weeks to study the manual and four weeks for practical, the girls had a fantastic result at Branch with Evie getting Gold and Kathryn Silver and Emilia 5th and Jess 6th. Great work girls!

For Open and Masters competitors, Branch is generally viewed as a warm up for State Championhsips. State this year was held at

Swansea and we had seven members in our team. Shannon came away with Gold! The following day, the team returned for a second year at Patrol Competition and with a larger field of teams, the team won the Lifesaver Relay; and ended up with a bronze medal. An amazing result and improvement on last year's scores too.

COVID-19

This is a section that we need to include in our annual report for historical reasons. It is not a section that we anticipated ever having to write. There are few events that come along in history that change the world at short notice and materially impact nearly everyone. COVID-19 is such an event and neither North Steyne SLSC nor its members were immune from its effects.

COVID-19 was first identified on 7th January 2020. The "once in a century pandemic" had far reaching negative effects on world health and economic markets. In early 2020 there was little known or written about COVID-19. No one knew what to expect. No one knew how to behave. Life, as most of us knew it, was massively disrupted. It still is for many.

The Sydney northern beaches are renown for their relaxed beach culture and high numbers of tourists. It quickly became apparent that the pandemic affected the way the public and our members could visit our beach and surf club. Lockdown led to the early closure of the 113th season, a decision our Club Captain did not take lightly at the time.

By April 2020, as confirmed cases and deaths due to the coronavirus rose rapidly around the globe, the Australian Government enacted public health orders which instituted border closures and regional lockdowns. It was the biggest loss of civil liberties and freedom witnessed in Australia by anyone living. We were required to self-isolate, socially distance, wash our hands and provide our contact details for tracing purposes.

If we travelled to known "hot spots" we were required to go into self-isolation or mandatory quarantine. If "viral clusters" emerged we were asked to get tested in one of the pop-up clinics. We were also told to work from home.

With no vaccine available in 2020, SLSNSW and SLSSNB acted fast to guide our Surf Club to form a COVID-19 safety plan to assist with preventing the spread of the virus. The decision was made to close our entire club until the plan was completed and approved.

A COVID-19 Committee of Chris Stewart, President, Cath Hillier, Secretary, Dan Hillier, Club Captain and Paul Mathew, Executive Officer, was formed. Cath worked closely with branch to ensure our club facilities and activities met the requirements for the COVID Safety Plan. All Directors were required to write COVID safety plans for activities within their portfolio and update then when required.

Our COVID-19 Safety Plan was detailed and 12

pages long in fine print, and effective 1st August 2020. Due to the lockdowns, we did not have our usual end of season Awards Presentation Evening, and our 113th AGM was postponed until 12th September whereby only 30 people could attend in person due to social distancing rules. This led to a late start of this season.

A national QR code registry was established and mandatory signing in was required for everyone attending the club, by this stage our club had reopened but with restrictions in place.

In late October 2020 environmental health managers from the Northern Sydney Public Health Unit visited the club to ensure we were compliant. In mid-November QR codes were mandatory for restaurants, cafes, pubs and bars across the State.



The earliest signs that this season was going to be far from clear and difficult to manage occurred around 8th September when the press stated, "Sydney's beaches will be forced to close again over summer if crowd sizes mean COVID-19 restrictions are flouted, local mayors and Councils have warned". Images of crowded Bondi Beach were beamed all around the world with beachgoers insensitive to the spread of the virus and human suffering that was occurring in other parts of the world.

Beachgoers were also oblivious to the potential risk of viral spread from congregating in large numbers. Local Councils, including Sydney Northern Beaches, were quick to point out "that public health orders still apply to manage COVID-19 restrictions at beaches". People can

gather in groups of up to 20 adhering to the fourmetre square rule. Individuals face maximum penalties of \$11,000, imprisonment or on-the-spot fines of \$1,000 for breaches. Not in my lifetime do I recall a time that you could be imprisoned for going to the beach.

In November 2020, drones were used by Surf Lifesaving NSW and Northern Beaches Council to monitor social distancing on Sydney northern beaches.

The pandemic placed a considerable administrative, management and economic burden on the club this season. Cleaning costs dramatically increased due to the level of sanitisation required to meet safety standards. 'COVID Safe' training was provided online for volunteers who put their hand up to be COVID Marshalls, hi-visibility vests were purchased; the supply of hand sanitiser and cleaning products (Hospital grade) was vigilantly maintained. Signage around the club constantly needing updating as restricitons changed.

Every activity within the club was required to have a COVID-19 safety plan including Nippers, education courses, and youth and senior training sessions. Our public BBQ service, the Clubroom Bar, the gymnasium, IRB and board/boat sheds also required detailed safety plans. All this needed to be implemented, clearly communicated to our members and updated as and when required.

On 22nd November we ran a successful branch Nipper carnival under COVID-19 safe conditions. Parents were unable to congregate, effectively only picking up and dropping off. Events were limited and COVID-19 Marshalls were appointed.

Education training and assessments were also affected. Manikins and other equipment had to be wiped down and sanitised between candidates. Assessments were limited to 24 people and assessments were run within clubs rather than at "central venues". In some cases, assessments were either cancelled or postponed, not because of dangerous surf conditions, but because of COVID-19 restrictions.



Weekend nipper events were also modified, parents were encouraged to become Age Managers as that way they were allowed to be on the beach with their children otherwise they were only allowed to watch from the promenade. Each week COVID-19 Marshalls were on duty, ensuring all families signed in for contact tracing purposes.

The season was moving along nicely under the new "normal" when on 16 December 2020, Sydney Northern Beaches recorded two cases of COVID-19. That was the beginning of the "Avalon cluster" which grew rapidly and included several hotspots around Manly. There was considerable correspondence that followed from branch and Council. On 17th December, NSW Public Health recommended that residents on the Northern Beaches from the Spit Bridge to Palm Beach stay home for the next 3 days and isolate to stop the current COVID cluster growing further out of control.

SLS Sydney Northern Beaches cancelled all surf sports events and education assessments that were scheduled for that weekend and within a day patrols on all 21 Sydney Northern Beaches were closed. Nipper events were also cancelled. North Steyne shut the club down and access was denied to all members including the gymnasium. The situation worsened in coming days when Sydney Northern Beaches was put in lockdown by creating a "red zone" north of Narrabeen bridge and an "orange zone" south to the Spit Bridge prohibiting anyone from entering or leaving those zones except for essential services. Christmas holiday patrolling was observational only and patrolling members were excused if they were unable to attend due to lockdown.

With the pandemic still unpredictable, further events had to be cancelled such as the Christmas party, the Ocean Swim and our life member and distinguished service function. Other events such as the Awards Presentation Night had to be postponed only days before due to another outbreak, thankfully it was able to be held in June.



Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to present the 2021 Financial Report for the North Steyne Surf Life Saving Club on behalf of the Board.

Despite continued challenges due to COVID-19, we had another good year financially. We made a net profit of \$47,809 (compared to \$57,777 last season). We also increased our total cash holdings by \$59,594. Our total accumulated earnings increased by \$56,383 to \$810,938 as a result of the net profit and the allocation to reserves for the Special Purpose Funds. Having a strong balance sheet and cash position is crucial in ensuring sustainability during these uncertain times.

Our total income increased from \$285,525 to \$322,307. This increase was mainly due to an increase in grants and government assistance, which more than compensated for a reduction in interest received from \$11,635 to \$5,453. The increase in grant income included total grants of \$11,670 from Surf Life Saving NSW due to COVID-19 and a grant of \$2,689 from Service NSW. Increased revenue from hosting carnivals, the bar and hall rental income helped offset reductions in sponsorship and BBQ income.

Total expenditure increased from \$227,748 to \$274,498. The main contributors to this increase were significantly higher cleaning costs due to COVID-19, increased salary costs (mainly as a result of JobKeeper top-ups), increased lifesaving costs and an increase in cost of goods sold for clothing (the later matched by an increase in clothing income).

I would like to acknowledge our major sponsors and donations:

- The Federal Government for government assistance as a result of COVID-19;
- The NSW Government for a COVID-19 small business support grant and other grants;
- The Northern Beaches Council for the Council Patrol Incentive Scheme grant;
- Surf Life Saving NSW for COVID-19 and life saving equipment grants and a distribution from its fundraising activities;
- Surf Life Saving Australia for a Beach Safety Equipment grant;
- Balgowlah RSL for a grant for the Special Needs, Nipper and Youth programs and donations in respect of meat raffles;
- Fairfax Media for a donation in respect of assistance we provided for the Sun Run;
- Lions club of Manly for a donation in respect of our Special Needs program.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the 11-month period ended 30 April 2021

Note 1 - Summary of significant accounting policies

The following explains the significant accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements. Unless otherwise stated, such accounting policies were also adopted in the corresponding reporting period.

General

The financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial report preparation requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission and Charitable Fundraising Act. The board has determined that the club is not a reporting entity. North Steyne Surf Life Saving Club Inc is a not-for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Division 60 of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the following specific accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this report.

Basis of accounting

The statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values, or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

Registration fees

All registration fees are bought to account in the year to which they apply as and when received from the members. The capitation fees, due to Surf Life Saving New South Wales Inc and Sydney Northern Beaches Surf Life Saving, are remitted as and when invoiced and shown as a separate expenditure item.

Donations and sponsorship income

Donations & sponsorship income is recognised when amounts are received or receivable.

Grants

Grants are recognised in the same period as the related expense or asset is recognised. Grants received in advance are shown as deferred income. COVID grants were received in the 2021 year from Surf Life Saving New South Wales Inc and Northern Beaches Council.

Government Assistance

Government assistance represents the Boosting Cash Flow and JobKeeper payments received in response to COVID-19.

Cash at bank

Cash at bank and term deposits represents monies deposited with the Commonwealth Bank of Australia and Bank of Queensland.

Inventories

Inventories have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Property, plant and equipment

- i. Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost, independent of directors' valuations. All assets are depreciated over their useful life
- ii. Over the years, the club has collected considerable memorabilia. These memorabilia were originally recorded at a nominal value but has subsequently been fully depreciated to zero hence the financial accounts do not ascribe any value to memorabilia assets
- iii. The cost of the day to day servicing of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the profit and loss as incurred
- iv. Depreciation rates used for each major class of asset are:

Note 2 - Related parties

Transactions with committee members or their committee-member related entity occurred within a normal member or supplier relationship on terms and conditions no more favourable that those which it is reasonable to expect that the entity would have adopted if dealing with the committee member or their committee-member at arms-length in the same circumstance.

Note 3 – Segment information

The club derives revenue primarily from its members, sponsors and fundraising activities to support its role in providing beach life saving services and operations. The club's activities are principally carried out at North Steyne Beach, located in NSW.

Note 4 - Subsequent events

The continuing COVID-19 pandemic and related restrictions will impact our operations due to government mandated compliance requirements and additional WHS measures. It is expected that revenue will also be impacted across a number of areas.

Our Lifesaving Services Agreement is on similar terms and levels as this past season and we continue to operate under the same terms and conditions as per our license agreement, now expired.


